Inspiring Initiatives to Reduce Plastic Waste Pilots and Campaigns

From single-use plastic free markets and innovative small and medium shops and restaurants to deposit-return schemes for e-commerce and advanced online waste notification platforms in ports: 'Rethinking Plastics' supported 24 pilot projects implemented by non-profit organisations across China, Indonesia, the Philippines, Thailand and Vietnam. They tested new approaches or up-scaled good practices for a sustainable consumption and production of plastics and improved plastic waste management on land and sea.

In addition, Plastic Beasts appeared in Vietnam, while Eca, the Beach Capitana, got active to reduce plastic waste in the Philippines. Movies documented good solutions to prevent marine litter in Sorong, the gateway to Raja Ampat in Indonesia and visitors of an exhibition in Bangkok got "Tangled" through arts and photography. In China, youth ambassadors, parents and kids alike told stories for a less plastic lifestyle. Awareness raising and education are the first steps to change behaviour — how do you contribute to reduce marine litter?

We looked for example at alternatives for single-use plastics, including the introduction of reuse options and alternative materials for plastic packaging in e-commerce and transport, food delivery and takeaway, cafes and restaurants, in schools retail, small local shops and traditional markets. And we explored the potential of ecolabelling and recycling standards and the impact of green public procurement.

To improve plastic waste management in the region and close the loop for disposed material, we looked closer into the collection and sorting procedures in the countries, as well as into the recycling practices. We analysed current value chains and means of collaboration, including the important role of informal waste workers for local waste management systems.

EPR — Extended Producer Responsibility — played an important role as many of the partner countries are working on EPR regulations or steps to get there. We supported this development and provided knowledge, training and tools to deepen the understanding of this concept, which has the potential to provide financing and improve the waste management systems.

We also worked with ports in the region to improve their ship waste management services, regulations and reception facilities and train staff and ships accordingly. In addition, we cooperated with the fishing communities to collect and discharge caught ocean waste on land through "Fishing for Litter" activities
